# **The Gesellschaft Deutscher Chemiker**

- Largest chemical society in Continental Europe
- > 31,000 members
- Not-for-profit registered charity
- > 50 employees, annual budget > 10 million €
- > 30 Divisions and Working Parties
- ca. 60 local sections
- Scientific publishing and dissimination of information among statutory aims
- Owner and co-owner of > 20 scientific journals
- Including Angewandte Chemie, one of the leading journals in chemistry
- Significant income from publishing





#### GDCh Positionpaper "On the Future of Scientific Publishing"

- Update of the "discussion paper" from 2004
- Committee established spring 2012
- Members from acadamia, chem/pharm industry, publishers, libraries, funding organizations
- Unanimously passed by GDCh Board on 2 December 2013
- Available in German and English at <u>www.gdch.de/positionen</u>
- EuCheMS/EPS paper developed independently
- Nevertheless siginificant overlap

- No reallocation of research funds

## Recommendations

- GDCh supports free access to scientific information
- It recommends the green Open Access model (with adequate embargo time) as most suitable at the moment
- The gold Open Access model still contains many unsolved problems
- GDCh recommends to its members, scientific institutions, companies and science policy makers to consider critically the possibilities of OA and the points mentioned



# **Our Gold OA Experiment: ChemistryOpen**

- Launched by ChemPubSoc Europe and Wiley-VCH in 2012
- First society backed gold OA journal in chemistry
- Same editorial policy as with all other journals
- APC 2,500 EUR (CPSE members 2,000 EUR)
- First JIF (2015): 3,25
- Reluctance among authors
- Low number of regular submissions
- Only higher when APC was waived 2014-15
- Low revenues







# Conclusions

- Authors in chemistry don't care much about OA
- And are sceptical about Gold OA ("additional hassle")
- No publication w/o quality control
- No mandated Open Access
- No reduction of research funding due to transition to OA
- No non-scientific criteria in the publication process
- Green OA preferred over Gold OA
- Green OA needs appropriate embargo period
- Whatever academic publishing of the future looks like, it must be of benefit for the progress of science
