Our OA policies

- We provide Gold OA options in all our journals
 - APCs: £1,000 (Communication, Technical Note); £1,600 (Full Paper); £2,500 (Review Article)
 - Member discounts available for APCs
 - Gold for Gold scheme can cover APCs for Gold subscribers
 - Choice of CC BY and CC BY NC license
- We now have 1 gold OA journal *Chemical Science*
 - APCs waived
- Deposition of authors' final accepted version in an institutional repository is permissible with full text of article available 12 months after publication
- Article metadata can be deposited in a non-commercial repository at any time after publication






Gold for Gold

- RSC Gold subscribing institutions are provided voucher codes for authors to publish Gold OA free of charge
- Number of voucher codes received is calculated from an institution's Gold subscription divided by our standard APC
- Additional Gold for Gold vouchers can be purchased at discounted bulk rates
- Pilot programme to assess the market and support the community




Growth in Gold OA at the RSC



About 10% of our content is published Gold OA Vast majority is via the G4G scheme, under 1% is via "paid" APCs















Distribution of Gold OA articles published in RSC journals


